## Picot Fingerless Gloves Crochet

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\* Difficulty level: medium

Size: woman, medium

## Stitch markers

When working in circle, I always use a stitch marker to mark the first stitch of a row. This way, I always know where to start a new row and where to finish it. It is also very useful when you need to count the stitches. It can be a ring, a safety pin, a paper clip, a piece of yarn, etc.

- 1. Chain 30 stitches with a 4.5 mm hook (size 7 US). Join the chain in a circle.
- 2. Make 1 row of single crochets.
- 3. Change to a 3.75 mm hook (size 5 US) and make 1 row of single crochets.
- 4. Make 1 row of picot stitches, one picot every two stitches with a slip stitch in between. You should have 15 picots for the whole row.
- Make 1 row of double crochets every two stitches (\*1 dc, 1 chs\*). End with a double crochet. Make sure you only make 30 stitches in total for the whole row; it is easy to add stitches after a row of picot.
- 6. Make 1 row of single crochets.
- 7. Make 1 row of picots as previously done.
- 8. Make 3 rows of single crochets. Again, make sure you only make 30 stitches in total for the whole row.
- Continue without joining with 6 rows of double crochets (to form a gap of 3" for the thumb). You should still have 30 stitches on each row.
- 10. Join with a slip stitch. Continue with 3 rows of double crochet.


To make a bigger or a smaller glove, just add or remove 2 stitches at a time when you chain in step 1

## How I make the picot stitch

Chain 4. Remove hook from last chain stitch and insert inside first chain stitch. Then insert inside the last stitch. You now have two stitches around the hook. Purl and pull through both stitches.



Make a slip stitch in the following stitch of the row to attach the picot to your work.



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
